Flood of Entries for World Junior Surfing Championships

The 2003 Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships looks set to produce a spectacular display of surfing at Durban's North Beach from August 17 – 23 as entries pour in for the inaugural event.

Seventeen countries have confirmed their entries and these include hosts and defending World Grommet champions South Africa along with Australia, New Zealand, Tahiti, Japan, USA, Hawaii, Brazil, Argentina, Costa Rica, Peru, Barbados, Ecuador, Israel, the UK, Ireland and France.

Host nation South Africa will have a distinct psychological and local advantage going into the tournament, having won the Quiksilver ISA World Surfing Games in Durban last year coupled with the fact that they will not be traveling to a strange country. Local knowledge of the venue will undoubtedly add to the 'Ama Quik Quik' national junior team's confidence.

The preparation for the hosting of the World Junior Championships has been thorough, as have the plans to select the best possible South African team for the tournament

"A comprehensive series of regional trials has produced good results thus far," says convener of selectors for Surfing South Africa, Mr. Robin de Kock. "Our final selection trial will be at Durban's New Pier on May 24 and 25, and we are delighted with the depth of juniors from which to choose our team."

However, the battle for medals will be met with strong resistance from leading surfing nations such as Australia, USA, Brazil and Hawaii, with emerging powers Japan, Tahiti, New Zealand and France clearly also in the running for silverware.

The ISA's decision to provide a singular focus for world junior surfing has resulted in the junior division being withdrawn from the biennial World Surfing Games and amalgamated with what was the Quiksilver World Grommet Titles, into a single new event.

The ISA World Junior Surfing Championships will be held annually, with the 2003 event featuring U18 and U16 Boys World Championship Divisions as well as an U19 Girls World Championship division. The Junior Team World Championship title will also be decided in a separate team contest during the event.

The tournament is sanctioned by the International Surfing Association (ISA) and is hosted by Surfing South Africa (SSA)

Mixed results for Ama Quik Quik in surfing international

Ama Quik Quik, the SA junior surfing team, produced a mixed bag of results in the SANZ International surfing tournament against the New Zealand and SA Future Stars teams at Bay of Plenty in Durban on Friday afternoon.

Competing in light onshore one to 1.3 meter (3-4 foot) waves that provided plenty of opportunity for maneuvering, the SA U/19 girls were the best performers with top seed Rosanne Hodge (EL), Stacey Guy (Melkbosstrand – CT) and local lass Jessica Matthews winning the three heats contested.

Kate Matthews and official reserve Tammy-Lee Smith (Salt Rock-KZN) placed second in their respective encounters to progress directly to the semi-finals along with the heat winners and Jessica Santorik, New Zealand's top performer, while the balance of the NZ girls and the three Future Stars will contest the 're-qualifying' rounds on Saturday.

The U/18 boys saw SA top seed Ricky Basnett place third behind NZ's Matt Scorrington and Michael Banks when the runner-up in last year's World Surfing Games junior division could not find any waves offering scoring potential during the 20 minute heat.

Basnett will be joined in Saturday's requalifiers by SA third seed Keegan Nel (EL) who was judged to have committed an interference and had one of his scoring rides removed from his tally, and also knocked one of the fins out his surfboard in the same incident. Nel finished third behind teammate and Durban local Andrew Groenewald and Future Stars Scott Venter (Bluff-KZN).

New Zealand standout Bobby Hansen won a close encounter against SA #2 seed Damien Fahrenfort (Kommetjie-CT) with SA reserve Shaun Payne (St Francis Bay) and Josh Salie (Cape Town) of the Future Stars in third and fourth places.

The U/16 boys provided several outstanding performances with SA top seed Josch Schmeltzer (Westville) justifying his status by winning his heat to advance directly to the semis along with NZ second seed Richard Christie.

In-form Rudy Palmboom (Bluff-KZN) vindicated his inclusion in the Future Stars squad by winning his heat to advance along with Brandon Roberts (Fish Hoek-CT) and they were joined by Brandon Jackson (Durban North) and Morehu Roberts (NZ) from heat three, where Durban standout Jordan Smith was relegated to third place after an interference call.

The SANZ International, a warm up contest for the Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships that starts at North Beach in Durban on Sunday, is providing the Ama Quik Quik and New Zealand teams with valuable pre-event knowledge of the conditions.

The event continues on Saturday at the Bay of Plenty with the requalifying heats in all three divisions, followed by the individual semi-finals and finals. The 45-minute Tag Team event that determines the team title is scheduled for approximately 12.30pm and the awards ceremony at about 1.30pm at the event site.

Ama Quik Quik given wake-up call by New Zealand junior surfers

The highly touted Ama Quik Quik SA junior surf team was given a timely reminder of the commitment and focus required to succeed at the highest level when their New Zealand counterparts clinched the team trophy and U/19 girl's title in the SANZ International at Bay of Plenty in Durban on Saturday.

The warm-up event for next week's Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships, which also featured an SA Future Stars squad, was completed in half-meter (2 foot) choppy waves and a stiff NE onshore wind that made performing high scoring maneuvers difficult.

Nevertheless, the well drilled NZ squad utilized the conditions better than the locals, using only four of their five surfers in the 45 minute Tag Team event, thereby giving each sufficient time to select waves with the highest scoring potential, while the five surfers in the SA and Future Stars rushed their rides in order to finish in the allotted time.

The result was a 99.3 vs. 91.3 point victory for the visitors who become the first holders of the unique abalone shell and yellow wood SANZ trophy, with the Future Stars earning just 54.9 but plenty of valuable experience.

SA redeemed some pride in the U/18 boys with a convincing victory for top seed Ricky Basnett (Bluff) who atoned for being relegated to the requalifying rounds and a second place in his semi-final to beat the highly

talented New Zealand duo of Miky Banks and Bobby Hansen in the final, with SA #3 seed Keegan Nel (EL) taking fourth place.

The U/16 boys was an all SA affair that as won by the team reserve Brandon Jackson (Durban North) followed by Jordy Smith (Durban), Josh Redman (Morningside-KZN) and Josch Schmeltzer (Westville-KZN) who finished in that order.

The U/19 girls produced an excellent display by Kelly Clarkson, the NZ #1 seed from Raglan, as she found the best available waves and performed several strong maneuvers to overcome the challenge of SA #3 Stacey Guy (Melkbosstrand-CT) to secure the gold medal with compatriot Jessica Santorik taking bronze and SA #1 Rosanne Hodge (EL) in fourth.

The Ama Quik Quik brains trust will not be satisfied with this set of results and the holders of the 2002 Grommets team title, won for the first time in Australia last year, need to spend a significant portion of Sunday practicing this aspect if they hope to mount a serious challenge for the world junior title.

The inaugural Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships officially start at 11am on Sunday with the Parade of Nations where the 200 participants from 18 nations will march along the Lower Marine Parade from Dairy Beach to North Beach.

This followed by the emotive Sand Ceremony on North Beach when each team presents sand from its beaches, which are then mixed together to signify the joining of the surfing nations of the planet.

The first heats of the event are due to enter the surf at North Beach on Monday morning with the champions in the three individual divisions and the team title crowned at the event venue on the afternoon of Saturday 23 August.

Colorful ceremony gets world junior surfing championships underway

The colorful Parade of Nations, featuring suitably attired teams from the 18 participating nations marching along the beachfront in Durban behind a troupe of young Zulu dancers, provided a fitting start for the Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships that runs from Sunday to Saturday, 17-23 August.

Decked out in a kaleidoscope of official team gear representing the diversity of countries and cultures that make up the surfing nations of the world, the teams marched from Dairy Beach to the event venue at North Beach to the strains of Calypso music provided by the Caribbean Connection.

An a capella rendition of the South African national anthem and an emotional and well rehearsed traditional 'Haka' by the entire New Zealand men's squad brought cheers from the assembled dignitaries and onlookers.

Apologies were heard on behalf of the Hawaiian and Puerto Rican teams whose journey to the event have been interrupted by the power outages on the East Coast of the USA. Both teams are due to arrive on Sunday afternoon, which the Hawaiians will be pleased about after spending four days in a downtown Cincinnati hotel where they were diverted to when New York's airports were closed.

A representative from each team then poured sand from the beaches of their nation into the specially prepared container in the Sand Ceremony, with South Africa's Deon Ngcobo scooping sand off the beach next to the podium into his cap and pouring on top of that already there.

Surfing South Africa (SSA) President Ken Vaughan welcomed those present and wished everyone well before SSA general manager and event coordinator Robin de Kock thanked those involved in the event for their contribution, particularly Arthur Limbouris of Quiksilver South Africa, whose backing was crucial in bringing the event to fruition.

Deputy Mayor of Durban, Logie Naidoo, welcomed all the participants to the city and wished them well in their endeavors, ending with his wish that South Africa wins the team title and that everyone have a good time in Surf City.

The first heats of the inaugural Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships take to the surf at North Beach on Monday morning where they will compete in U/16 and U/18 boys and U/19 girls divisions as well as the Tag Team event that determines the national team champions.

The event uses a double elimination format that sees the top two finishers in each four person heat advance to the next round of the 'winners' stream while third and fourth places are relegated to the 'repechage' stream.

The top two in repechage heats advance to the next round of repechage heats with the other two eliminated from the event. The Grand Final in each of the three individual divisions will be contested on Saturday 23 August featuring the top two from the 'winners' stream and the top two from the 'repechage' stream.

The winner will be crowned the 2003 ISA World Junior Surfing Champion in his or her division and will receive the gold medal while silver, bronze and copper medals will be awarded to second to fourth placed finishers respectively.

World junior surfing championships cut short by strong winds

Near gale force NE winds that turned the surf at North Beach into a churning cauldron of whitewater forced organizers to cut short the first day's action at the Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships in Durban on Monday.

Contest Director Marcos Bukao (Brazil) put a stop to proceedings at the end of the first round of the U/18 boys division, postponing the scheduled U/19 girls first round until Tuesday morning.

"We decided that the conditions were too extreme for the girls with the strong current and overhead waves," said the vastly experienced ISA official, adding "We have sufficient time between now and Friday in which to make up the three hours we lost today, and the girls will have much better conditions in the morning."

The top contenders in the U/18 boy's heats had no problems with the closely spaced, fast breaking 1.5 meter (5 foot) waves, completing some outstanding maneuvers although there were very few long rides.

Brazilian top seed Leandro Bastos posted the highest heat total of the day – 14.33 out of a possible 20 for his best two rides – in heat #15, the penultimate heat of the day. The Pan-American champion, who missed last year's Quiksilver World Surfing Games (WSG) in Durban because of a broken leg, showed his class with a polished display that relegated reigning world U/18 champion, Spain's Gony Zubizarreta, to second place.

Both advanced to Wednesday's round #2 of U/18 boys while Juan Cruz from Argentina, who placed third in the heat, will have to finish first or second in heat #6 of the Requalifying round on Tuesday in order to stay in contention.

Others who utilized the conditions well included South African #4 seed Andrew Groenewald (Durban), Aritz Aramburu (Spain) and Heitor Pereira (Brazil) who had a see-saw duel in heat #2 that was narrowly won by the Spaniard, and Ben Dunn (Aus) who scored a convincing victory.

Dunn also shared the highest scoring single ride of the day – 7.67 points from a possible 10 – with SA third seed Keegan Nel (EL), who won his heat, and Alejandro Moredo (Puerto Rico) who placed second behind Ricky Basnett, the top seeded local surfer and runner-up in the U/18 division at the 2002 WSG.

"It was pretty difficult out there, with a strong current and really bumpy wave faces," explained Basnett about the conditions, "The first heat of an event is always difficult so I'm stoked I'm through that one," he added on his performance.

Nearly 200 competitors from 18 countries are participating this, the inaugural Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships, which has been created to provide an event that crowns the world's best surfers in

U/16 and U/18 boys and U/19 girl's categories, as well as team champions who are determined by the Tag Team event.

The championship runs daily until Saturday 23 August when the champions will be crowned at the event site on North Beach.

QUIK FACTS

WHAT: The inaugural Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships (WJSC) which will crown the undisputed world junior surfing champions in three divisions plus a Tag Team event that determines the team champions.

WHEN: Sunday to Saturday, 17-23 August 2003

WHERE: North Beach, Durban, South Africa

WHO: All 48 nations affiliated to the ISA are invited to send teams made up of four members in each of the U/16 and U/18 boys plus U/19 girls divisions and a three person management team and a judge

The 2003 Quiksilver ISA WJSC has attracted entries from 18 countries who are sending teams of between one and 15 members with the total number of participants exceeding 200

FORMAT: The WJSC gives every participant the opportunity to compete at least twice by using a 're-qualifier' round after the first and second rounds of competition. Competitors contest three or four person heats with the top two in each heat progressing to the next round and third or fourth place relegated to the 're-qualifier' rounds that enable them to advance to the next round if they place first or second.

From round three onwards the top two advance to the next round and those placed lower are eliminated from the event. The four person finals in all divisions and the Tag Team final that determines team champions will be staged on Saturday 23 August starting at approximately 12 noon.

Tag Team surfing is a form of relay surfing contested by five person teams comprising 2 x U/16 and 2 x U/18 boys plus one x U/19 girl who accumulate points during the one hour heats. The two teams with the highest combined tally advance to the next round with the top four in the final.

STATUS: The event is sanctioned by the International Surfing Association (ISA), the governing body for surfing worldwide, which is recognized by the International Olympic Committee (IOC). The ISA has 48 affiliated national federations.

This event provides a singular focus for junior surfing by withdrawing the junior divisions from the biennial World Surfing Games and amalgamating them with what was the Quiksilver World Grommet Titles to create the first edition of what will become the annual World Junior Surfing Championships.

PRIZES: The top four performers in the individual disciplines and the top four nations in the team event are awarded gold, silver, bronze and copper medals.

PRODUCTION: The event is produced by Surfing South Africa (SSA), the controlling body of surfing in this country and the local affiliate of the ISA, in conjunction with Quiksilver SA. The Event Coordinator is SSA General Manager, Robin de Kock, and the Contest Director is Marcos Bukao (Brazil). Greg Swart of Quiksilver is the Executive Producer.

Great performances at world junior surfing champs

The U/19 girls and U/16 boys in the Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships took advantage of the excellent surf at North Beach in Durban on Tuesday, the second day of the 6-day event, posting several outstanding performances as they reveled in the head high waves.

“The standard of surfing in the first round of this event has been incredibly high,” said Nuno Jonet, the veteran international surf commentator who speaks seven languages. “These teenagers are already surfing so well it is difficult to imagine how good they are going to become in five years time.”

On a day where 30 heats were completed and competitors from all three individual divisions competed, the performance of the day undoubtedly belonged to 15 year-old Stephanie Gilmore from Australia, who was awarded the highest single wave score – 8.83 points – and the highest accumulated heat total of the day - 16.0 points - in her round one heat.

To put Gilmore’s performance into perspective, the heat runner-up, Caroline Sarran (France), arrived in South Africa after winning an ASP World Qualifying Series event in Europe last month and also defeated reigning five-time world champ Layne Beachley (Aus) in round three of the Roxy Pro at Tavarua, Fiji, in May as a wildcard.

However, against Gilmore this experienced campaigner was left needing a near perfect 9.67 point ride for victory, although both advanced to Thursday’s girls Round Two.

Amongst the U/16 boys it was the likes of Casey Brown (Haw), the outstanding talent of Reunion Island’s Jeremy Flores who is representing France, Brazil’s Junior Faria and Pablo Paulino, Daniel Asmus (Aus) and the top seeds from South Africa, Josch Schmeltzer, and New Zealand, Richard Christie, who dominated proceedings.

Schmeltzer captured the highest scoring ride of the division, an 8.67, for a action packed series of high risk vertical maneuvers, but Brown accumulated the highest two wave heat total – 14.33 points from a possible 20 – by completing rides of 8.50 and 5.83.

With the waves continuing to pour into North Beach, the six heats in the U/18 boys Requalifiers Round One were completed where the third placed finishers in each heat were eliminated from the event. The first three of six U/16 boys Requalifying heats followed this and again those who placed third are out of the event.

With the biggest swell of the winter battering the entire Southern coast of the continent along with gale force Westerly winds, organizers are confident of an increase in the size of the waves and offshore winds for the next couple of days in Durban.

Wednesday’s schedule sees the day’s proceedings start with the balance of the Requalifying heats for the U/16 boys followed by the Requalifiers for the U/19 girls and then Round Two for both U/18 and U/16 boys, which should produce more outstanding surfing.

Great surf conditions for girls in world junior champs

A light offshore SW wind and clean one to 1.5 meter (3-5 foot) waves greeted the U/19 girls on day two of the Quiksilver ISA World Surfing Championships at North Beach in Durban, justifying yesterday's decision to suspend the event after the completion of the U/18 boys first round.

The girls took full advantage of the conditions with the likes of Stephanie Gilmore (Aus) scoring the highest ride of the event – an exceptional 8.83 points from a possible 10 – and the highest combined heat total of 16.0 points for her best two rides.

The 15 year-old from Kingscliff, NSW, caught her first ride within 30 seconds of the start of the heat and recorded the day's highest score of 7.17 before paddling into a head high lefthander that she proceeded to carve up with committed top to bottom maneuvers that earned her 9.0 points from three of the judges and 8.5 from the other two for an 8.83 point average and the heat win.

Gilmore left her strongly tipped French contender Caroline Sarran needing a near perfect ride of 9.67 points in order to take first place, but both girls advanced to Thursday's girls round two. Sarran beat five time world champion Layne Beachley (Aus) in perfect waves in the Roxy Pro, an ASP World Championship Tour (WCT) event in Fiji in May, when the French teenager was given a wildcard.

Others who reveled in the North Beach surf included Tory Titcomb (Haw), Kelly Clarkson (NZ), Amanda Clegg (Aus) and Ornella Pellizzari from Argentina who was awarded 8.0 points for her best ride and relegated highly regarded Australian Jesse Dyer to the runner-up berth in the heat.

South African top seed Rosanne Hodge (EL) and #3 Stacey Guy (Melkbosstrand-CT) both won their heats, as did Laureen McGregor (Aus) and Lindsey Cottrell, the Kommetjie based American who is representing the USA at the event.

Tuesday's action continues with the round one of the U/16 boys followed by the U/18 boys requalifying round one and the first heats of the U/16 boys' requalifiers.

Good waves continue for world junior surfing champs

Honors evenly spread on fourth day of world junior surfing champs

Surfers from the major surfing nations and a couple of smaller countries shared the honors on day four of the 2003 Quiksilver ISA World Surfing Games being staged at North Beach in Durban.

Excellent one to 1.5 meter waves and early offshore westerly winds that changed to crosswind Southerlies later, produced an excellent stage for the world's best teenage surfers to display their talents, which they did with gusto.

The U/19 girls started the day's action and the Aussie pair of Stephanie Gilmore and Jesse Miley-Dyer were outstanding, each racking up 17.17 points out of a possible 20 for their best two rides to win their heats convincingly and advance to round three.

Caroline Sarran (Fra), Ornella Pellizzari (Arg), Amanda Clegg (Aus), Leilani Gryde (Haw) and Linsey Cottrell, the Kommetjie based American who is representing the USA, may have accumulated fewer points but were no less impressive in the head high waves as they won their heats.

South Africa's Jessica Matthews (Durban) and Stacey Guy (Melkbosstrand-CT) also reached the last 18 in the event by placing second in their respective heats while top seed Rosanne Hodge (East London) placed third and then third again in her Requalifying round heat to be eliminated from the event.

The girls will take to the surf again after the one remaining heat of the U/16 boys is completed on Friday morning, and will also complete their quarterfinals, which start at 12 noon.

The U/16 boys requalifiers saw six competitors getting back into the event in round three, but only one – Giancarlo Zampieri (Brz) – made use of the second chance when he finished second behind Richard Christie (NZ) in round three to advance to the last 12.

Australians Tim Wrench, the highest point scorer of the U/16's today with a 16.24 point haul, and Mitch Coleborn, Hawaiian Casey Brown and Wednesday's 19.93 point hero, Pablo Paulino (Brz), joined Christie by winning their encounters. Also progressing were SA's Jordan Smith and Josh Redman, Clay Marzo (Haw) and Dean Amess (NZ) who all placed second.

The U/18 boys saw SA top seed Ricky Basnett and Matt Scorrige (NZ) make stunning returns from the requalifying rounds by going on to win their Round three match-ups, with Aussie #2 Tevita Gukilau also reaching the last 16 by claiming a runner-up berth behind SA's Keegan Nel (EL).

Romain Lulhe (Fra) was the top point scorer of the day in this division, tallying 15.10 points for his top two rides to join compatriot Loic Erran, William Cardoso (Brz), Dean Harrington (Aus) and defending U/18 champ Gony Zubizarreta (Spain), as heat winners along with Basnett, Scorrige and Nel.

The U/18 quarterfinals are made up of three Australians, two each from the hosts South Africa, Spain, France, Brazil and USA and one each from New Zealand, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

The first round of Tag Team competition will take to the surf on Friday at approximately 1.15pm when the five person teams of South Africa, New Zealand and Tahiti do battle in this form of 'relay' surfing. Teams comprise two U/18 and two U/16 boys plus one U/19 girl and have 60 minutes during which each surfer must ride two waves, with one team member designated to ride three.

The team whose five surfers accumulate the most points in the time period is the winner, with penalties incurred for not completing all the rides in time, surfers leaving the marshalling point without being 'tagged' by their teammates and riders forgetting to 'claim' their rides by raising both hands in the air after completion.

The top two team from each heat progress to Saturday's semi-finals, with the top two from each semi then contesting the final where the winning team is the champion nation of the championships.

The second heat of Tag Team surfing on Friday features Australia, Hawaii, USA and Ireland while Brazil, France, Peru and Argentina will contest the third heat.

Organizers expect the size of the surf to drop to around one meter for Friday with offshore winds in the morning and a stiff North Easterly onshore wind in the afternoon.

Onshore conditions test junior surfers at world champs

Stiff onshore NE winds chopped up the surf at North Beach on day five of the Quiksilver ISA World Surfing Championships, creating difficult conditions for the competitors in round three of the U/19 girls and the quarterfinals of the U/18 and U/16 boys.

Soon after the last heat of the U/16 boys round three, held over from the previous day due to bad light, had been completed at 8am in the same excellent one to 1.5 meter (3-5 foot) surf that has graced the event since Tuesday, the onshore picked up speed.

Brazilian Junior Faria and South Africa's Brandon Roberts (Fish Hoek-CT) advanced to the last 12 in the quarterfinals of the U/16 by placing first and second respectively in the opening heat of the day, with Vincent Duvignac (Fra) and Morehu Roberts (NZ) eliminated due to their respective third and fourth place finishes.

The Aussie pair of Stephanie Gilmore and Jesse Miley-Dyer continued their march to the U/19 girls final with convincing and identical round three victories. The two who each scored excellent 17.17 point wins in round two, both won with 12.84 points today, demonstrating the adverse effect the onshore wind has on the scoring potential of the waves.

Caroline Sarran (Fra), Jessica Matthews (SAfr), Amanda Clegg (Aus) and Leilani Gryde (Haw) were the other round three heat winners and they will be joined in the quarterfinals at noon today by Ornella Pellizzari (Arg), Tory Titcomb (Haw), Lauren McGregor (Aus), Jessica Santorik (NZ), Stacey Guy (SAfr) and Gabriela Barros (Brz), all of whom placed second.

South Africa's Ricky Basnett (Bluff-KZN) franked his return to form since dropping into the round two requalifying heats by winning his quarterfinal heat with teammate Keegan Nel (EL) taking the runner-up spot and both moving into the semi-finals of the U/18 boys.

Tevita Gukilau, the Australian top seed, and William Cardoso (Brz) advanced from the second quarter and Ola Eleogram (Haw) and Leandro Bastos (Bra) from the third. They were joined in the semi-finals by Ben Dunn (Aus) and defending champion Gony Zubizarreta (Spain) after the Australian rode the best wave of the heat right on the siren to snatch victory in the final quarter.

Jordy Smith stars in quarterfinals at world junior surfing champs

Jordy Smith, the 15 year-old Durbanite and second seed in the Ama Quik Quik SA junior surfing team, was the top points scorer in the wind-affected quarterfinals of the Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships at North Beach, Durban, today (Friday).

With a solid one to 1.3 meter (3-4 foot) groundswell but stiff NE onshore winds that turned the surf into a mass of broken whitewater, the Durban local utilized his knowledge of the conditions to rack up a sensational 15.67 points for his best two rides that included finding his way into and then cleanly exiting the only tube ride to be ridden on the day.

Jordy left runner-up Tim Wrench (Aus) needing a near perfect 9.67 point ride to take the lead, while Wrench was impressive in staving off the challenge of Brazilian Pablo Paulino, the standout of the Wednesday's second round when recorded 19.43 points, the highest of the event, and SA third seed Brandon Roberts who placed fourth.

Smith and Wrench were joined in Saturday's semi-finals by Clay Marzo (Haw) and Richard Christie (NZ) from the first quarter and Mitch Coleborn (Aus) and Junior Faria (Brz) from the third, all of whom produced incredible surfing in the adverse conditions.

In a statement on the standard of women's surfing in their country, all four Australian girls have qualified for the U/19 girls semi-finals, along with South African second seed Jessica Matthews (Durban) and Tory Titcomb (Haw).

The Aussie pair of Stephanie Gilmore and Jesse Miley-Dyer have looked unstoppable throughout the event and duly won their quarterfinal encounters while Amanda Clegg and Lauren McGregor finished runner-up to Gilmore and Matthews respectively.

Honors were more evenly distributed in the U/18 boys where two South Africans, two Australians and two Brazilians will be joined by defending champion Gony Zubizarreta (Spain) and Hawaiian Ola Eleogram in the semifinals, with the top two in each heat progressing to the final.

Ricky Basnett, the Durban Bluff local and runner-up in the U/18 division of the World Surfing Games at the same venue last year, and compatriot Keegan Nel (EL) dominated the first quarter to advance, while Tevita Gukilau (Aus) and William Cardoso (Brz) did the same from the second.

Eleogram won heat three with Leandro Bastos (Haw) needing 8.0 points to take the lead, but well ahead of Loic Erran (Fra) in third, with Zubizarreta finishing second behind Australia's Ben Dunn, who has lived up to his pre-event billing as one of the favorites to lift the U/18 boys title.

The first heat in the Tag Team event, the discipline that ultimately will decide the team winners at these championships, resulted in the five person South Africa squad (four boys plus a girl) and the New Zealand squad both scoring 48.10 points. The well-drilled New Zealanders were awarded the victory when SA incurred a five point penalty for finishing late, with Tahiti placing third on 17.35 points.

Australia and Hawaii joined the top two from heat one in the semi-finals by outscoring Ireland and the USA in heat two before Brazil and France completed Saturday's lineup after seeing off the challenge of Argentina

and Peru. The semi-finals pit New Zealand against Hawaii and Brazil in the first semi with SA taking on Australia and France in the second.

Saturday's action starts at 8 am with the semi-finals for U/16 boys, U/19 girls, U/18 boys and the Tag Team followed by the finals, which will be staged in the same order starting from 12 noon. The awards presentation and crowning of the 2003 Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Champions will take place on the podium on North Beach starting at approximately 2.45 pm.

Australians dominate in world junior surfing champs

Australian surfers dominated the semi-finals of the three individual divisions at the 2003 Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships today, filling seven of the 12 spots in the finals due to superior surfing performances in the contestable one to 1.3 meter (3-4 foot) light onshore waves.

North Beach Durban was festooned with the national flags of the 17 nations competing in the inaugural world championships for surfers in the U/16 and U/18 boys and U/19 girls divisions, as the siren sounded at 8am this morning for the first heat of the sixth and final day.

Australians Mitch Coleborn and Tim Wrench overcame the challenge of Hawaii's Clay Marzo to qualify for the U/16 final while in the second semi, New Zealand's Richard Christie caught and rode the best waves of the 20 minute encounter to join the two Aussies.

South African star Jordy Smith clinched the fourth finals berth despite a subdued performance that netted him a pair of five point rides, which was sufficient to eliminate Brazilian Junior Faria who incurred an interference penalty and the loss of one of his two scoring rides.

The U/19 girls' semis were a triumph for the Aussies whose entire squad of four competitors reached the last eight, with three progressing to the final. Amanda Clegg and Jesse Miley-Dyer were too good for South Africa's Jessica Matthews in the first heat while Australian standout Stephanie Gilmore was joined by Tory Titcomb (Haw) in advancing from the second, with Lauren McGregor (Aus) eliminated.

The boys U/18 semis produced outstanding surfing with Hawaiian Ola Eleogram on fire in winning the first encounter from Brazil's William Cardoso with South Africa's Ricky Basnett a long way adrift in third place when he simply could not find any waves with scoring potential and defending champion Gony Zubizarreta (Spain) close behind in fourth.

The second semi started with Australian Ben Dunn taking an early lead after all surfers had completed two rides, but Leandro Bastos (Brazil) came back with a second eight point ride to snatch the win, despite Dunn finding an 8.73 point ride, the highest of the heat, towards the end.

With the heat leaders both scoring over 16 points, third placed Tevita Gukilau (Aus) and South Africa's Keegan Nel did not get a look in and Gukilau totaled 10.40 points and Nel a disappointing 5.03 for his top two rides combined.

The semi-finals of the tag Team event, where five person teams (four boys and girl) from each nation complete a form of relay surfing with the top two teams advancing to the final, are currently in progress with the winning team in the final crowned the 2003 Quiksilver ISA world junior champion nation.

The light NE onshore wind is predicted to freshen slightly later this afternoon but at present the effect of the wind on the surf is minimal and spectacular surfing is expected in the finals starting at approximately 12.45 pm

Brazil triumphs as Jordy, Jesse and Ben take surfing titles

Brazil clinched the team title at the 2003 Quiksilver ISA World Junior Surfing Championships at North Beach in Durban on Saturday as Jordy Smith (South Africa) and Australians Jesse Miley-Dyer and Ben Dunn took their respective U/16 boys, U/19 girls and U/18 boys world surfing titles.

The inaugural six day event created to honor the worlds best teenage surfers attracted more than 200 competitors from 17 nations and ended in warm onshore conditions with one to 1.5 meter (3-5 foot) contestable waves that gave the competitors every opportunity to strut their stuff and they produced an exceptional display of competitive surfing.

After a low-key semi-final where he finished second to advance to the final behind heat winner Richard Christie (NZ), 15 year-old Durban prodigy Jordy Smith was outstanding from start to the 25 minute U/16 final.

Taking off on a left breaking wave through the North Beach bowl, Jordy turned vertically off the bottom to bash the lip twice, throwing sheets of spray, before weaving his way all the way to the beach for a great 8.17 opening score that left his opponents having to play catch-up until the final siren.

Two good 7.0 and 7.50 point rides in the middle of the heat consolidated the Durbanite's lead and while Wrench came back with a 7.17 that left him needing an 8.50 for the title, Coleborn and Christie struggled to find any decent waves and both required a combination totaling 15.68 for victory.

The Girls U/19 final was even more one-sided once Stephanie Gilmore (Aus), who had been the standout in this division throughout the week, committed an title-destroying interference on Hawaiian Tory Titcomb in the opening minutes of the final, leaving the Aussie with only one counting score to her opponent's two.

Gilmore's teammate Jesse Miley-Dyer took full advantage of the situation and put in an inspired performance that in all fairness could well have beaten Gilmore's best efforts even with two rides counting. Being a goofy-foot (riding with right foot forward), Miley-Dyer faced the left breaking waves and attacked these with gusto, pulling off outrageous re-entries and slashing cutbacks in the steep waves in the bowl.

Amanda Clegg, the third Aussie in the final, could only muster a best score of 4.17 while Titcomb's best was a 3.60, which was no match for the winner's 8.83 and 7.5 and, along with Gilmore, they were left needing an incredible 16.34 by the new world champion.

The U/18 boys was a nail-biting affair by comparison with all four competitors in contention for the title when the final siren sounded to make Aussie top seed Ben Dunn a worthy recipient of the world title.

Dunn waited nearly 10 for his first ride, a lefthander through the bowl that connected with the inside section, for a solid 7.10 points. He backed that up five minutes later with a 5.50 that left him within 6.50 points of the lead, which had been held by the two Brazilians, Williams Cardoso and Leandro Bastos, who had five rides each by that stage.

An excellent left, with two upside down backhand re-entries, clinched the title for Dunn, but not before he had a scare as Cardoso rode his last wave from the back to the beach and was awarded 7.9 points when he needed 8.26 for victory.

Ola Eleogram (Haw) claimed third place with a committed performance but only one score over seven points, while Bastos ended fourth but not disgraced after leading for the first quarter of the final.

The Tag Team title went to Brazil for the first time in an official team event outside of South America when their four boys and a girl accumulated an incredible 56.65 points in 60 minutes. That left runners-up Australia and third placed New Zealand requiring seven points, and fourth placed South Africa needing 10, for victory.

Team coach Marcos Conde from Rio de Janeiro went down on his knees and kissed the sand when the final scores were announced while his whole team, who had noisily celebrated every maneuver by every Brazilian surfer throughout the event, piled on top of him.

The six-day event provides a singular focus for the ISA to honor junior surfers and replaces the Quiksilver Grommets Titles and has led to the withdrawal of the junior divisions from the biennial World Surfing Games.

The World Junior Surfing Championships will become an annual event hosted by any of the 42 countries affiliated to the ISA.

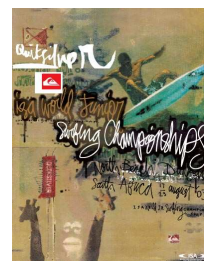
